

About the book

'Old Marley's magic was beginning to stir...'

George is about to spend his third Christmas without his mum. Since she died, George's life has felt dull and grey; his dad has thrown himself into his work and has no time for family, and definitely no time for Christmas.

Then, George stumbles across Marley's Curiosity Shop. There he finds a mysterious snow globe, which – though George can't quite understand how – appears to show a scene from George's past. A Christmas in which he and his family were together, and happy...

That night, George and his dad are swept on an adventure to three Christmases – past, present, and future. With help from new friends, and just a touch of magic, can they begin living life in full colour again?










LESSON 1! Christmas Past

Lead-in questions:

- What makes a good Christmas? What sights, smells, and feelings do you associate with it?
- What did Christmas used to be like for George in the story?

Activity: My Snowglobe of Christmas Past

- On page 11, George looks into the snowglobe and sees an image of a Christmas when his mum was alive and his family were all happy.
- Close your eyes and picture some of your happiest memories from Christmases of the past. It could be spending time with your family and friends, playing with toys, eating delicious food, or even building snowmen like George's memory!
- Draw your own scene from a Christmas Past on the snowglobe on the next page. Write a line or two next to it explaining why this memory is so special to you.



Lead-in questions:


- Why is Christmas different for George now? How do you think this makes him feel?
- Why does George call his father a 'Scrooge'? What do you know about Scrooge from A Christmas Carol?
- What is 'Old Marley's magic'? What kinds of adventures does it bring for George and his family?

Activity: My Magical Curiosity

- George's visit to Marley's shop leads him to encounter 'Christmas Curiosities' such as a magical snowglobe, his long-dead relative Walter Bishop, Tricksie the elf, and Randolph the Reindeer . . . to name a few!
- Now it's your chance to create your own festive magical curiosity! Think about who or what it is, what it or they can do, and what Christmas miracle or piece of magic it might perform? How might this curiosity help someone to remember the true spirit of Christmas?
- Paint or sketch your curiosity and perform a 'show and tell' on your tables, introducing your curiosities to each other.

Though he didn't know it yet, George was going to need every last drop.










Activity: Mix and match the texts!

- What do you think future Christmases will be like for George?


Activity: The Spirit of Christmas
