




The Undefeated

American writer and poet Alexander's *The Undefeated* is an ode to Black history, and the strength and bravery shown by people everyday. This poem references lyrics and lines originally shared by some of the world's most famous and celebrated heroes, but is also about everyday people.

The Undefeated won the Caldecott Medal, awarded to the most distinguished American picture book for children, and the Coretta Scott King Award, which recognises African American authors and illustrators of books for children and young adults. It was also named a Newbury Honor Book for its outstanding contribution to children's literature.

This book works as a starting point for those wanting to find out more about Africa and its many diverse countries and communities.




Atinuke began her writing career by performing stories all over the world, focusing on tales from Africa and the African diaspora.

Girl Wonder series


Malorie Blackman

Blackman's Girl Wonder books are about the adventures of Maxine, known as Girl Wonder, and her twin brothers Anthony and Edward.

Each of the books - *Girl Wonder and the Terrific Twins, Girl Wonder's Winter Adventures, and Girl Wonder to the Rescue* - contain multiple short stories about Maxine, who is always getting into trouble, but always has a plan to fix everything.

From building the biggest snowball the world has ever seen to scaring her mum at Halloween, these stories – the first of which were published in 1991 – are full of mischief and humour.

This book is one of five short story collections by Blackman that feature the character Betsey Biggalow.

In *Magic Betsey*, which contains four funny tales, Betsey puts on a magic show, and learns the importance of practice makes perfect and believing in yourself.

The Betsey series – which also consists of *Betsey's Birthday Surprise, Hurricane Betsey, Betsey Biggalow the Detective,* and *Betsey Biggalow is Here!* – are good for younger readers to help them build confidence in reading aloud or alone.

Brahmachari is the author of award-winning children's books, YA novels and short stories.

In *When Secrets Set Sail*, Usha's newly adoptive sister Imtiaz arrives shortly after Usha's grandmother Kali Ma has died; both feel lost, and clash. But when Kali Ma's ghost appears, they discover their house used to be a home for nannies who couldn't return to their Indian homeland, and Kali Ma can't pass on until the girls fulfil a promise she made years before. The pair, with their friend Cosmo and a couple of ghosts, must set off on a quest through London.

Brahmachari's debut *Artichoke Hearts* won the Waterstones Children's Book Prize in 2011, and she has had five nominations for the Carnegie Medal. She has previously served as Writer in Residence for BookTrust.




Hair Love



The Extraordinary Life of Mary Seacole by Nadia Redgrave, illustrated by Aleanna Harris, is about the woman now known for her medical work in the Crimean war. But for a long time, Seacole's story was lost, and this book will introduce readers to a woman who combated racial prejudice and still inspires.






These books feature Otto and Sheed, cousins, mischief makers and local sleuths in their zany town in Virginia, America.

With the help of some strange people and even stranger creatures, Otto and Sheed will have to put aside their differences to save their town before time stops for good.

The pair's second adventure, **The Last** *Mirror on the Left*, takes place a year later. Unlike the majority of their town, Missus Nedraw of the Rorrim Mirror Emporium remembers the time freeze from The Last Last-Day-of-Summer, and how Otto and Sheed took her mirrors without permission in order to fix their mess. She's willing to overlook their misdeeds if they help her capture one of her worst prisoners, who has escaped.



Gorman is the youngest presidential inaugural poet in US history, and was named the first ever National Youth Poet Laureate of the United States.

Also in 2021, Gorman will release a collection of poems that includes 'The Hill We Climb'. The inaugural poem is also available as a book on its own, with a foreword by Oprah Winfrey.

Harris was only the second Black woman ever elected to the US Senate when she took up her position in 2017.

This novel follows Yusuf, whose older sister is getting married. While Yusuf is happy that delicious food, lots of presents, and time spent with his cousins are on the horizon, he's not prepared to take his sister's place as the responsible one in his family. And so, Yusuf is left with one option: cause chaos and ruin the wedding.

Islam said of the book: "*Mayhem Mission* is a love letter to every multi-generational and multicultural family out there... In this day and age, it sometimes seems that there are too many expectations on people of colour to write narratives centred on heavy themes of inner-turmoil and identity. To combat that, Yusuf's story is a comedic celebration of what it means to be loved unconditionally — even if that love has a funny way of manifesting itself."

Accidental Trouble Magnet sees Omar trying to stay out of trouble (and not succeeding) when his family moves house and he has to attend a new school.




The Proudest Blue

This is an uplifting story by fencer Muhammad, the first Muslim American woman in hijab to compete and to win a medal for the United States in the Olympic Games, and novelist Ali, with gorgeous illustrations by Aly.

At age 15, Yousafzai was shot by the Taliban for speaking out for the rights of girls to get an education. She recovered in the UK, and has continued her activism, co-founding Malala Fund, a global movement of support for girls' education. She is the youngest person to ever be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.


The Girl Who Stole an Elephant







Johnson's fiction has often been inspired by the stories of people largely ignored by history, whether real (such as *The Race to the Frozen North*, about Matthew Henson, the first man to reach the North Pole, who was denied official recognition because of his skin colour), or fictional.

In *A Nest of Vipers*, Johnson weaves a tale about a group of larger-than-life con artists: Cato Hopkins, the youngest member of Mother Hopkins's 'family', a group of skilled fraudsters and pickpockets; Addy, who can become a very convincing boy when she needs to; Bella, who can charm any rich young man out of his fortune; and Sam, an escaped slave. Old age is slowing Mother Hopkins down, and she wants to carry out one last con, so the gang sets about bringing ruin upon the cruel slave captain, Captain Walker.

This action-packed story is about Nathaniel's experience of slavery in Britain. Nathaniel doesn't want to move to England with his master's family, as it means leaving behind his mother and sister on the Jamaican plantation. But then he remembers that his mother told him that once a slave sets for on English soil, they're free. Perhaps, Nathaniel thinks, he can earn his fortune and buy back his family's freedom.

Freedom is a fictional story based on historical events, and keen readers will identify many people who really existed, including slave-turned-author-and-abolitionist Olaudah Equiano, white abolitionist Granville Sharp, and former soldier Shadrack Furman, who was the first Black pensioner. A historical note at the end of the book summarises slavery for readers. *Freedom* won the Little Rebels Children's Book Award 2019.


Obama has also published a special edition of *Becoming*, which has been adapted for younger readers and has a new introduction.

She later worked in the Chicago mayor's office and at the University of Chicago, among others, and also founded the Chicago chapter of Public Allies, an organisation that prepares young people for careers in public service. 



Woodson's *Brown Girl Dreaming* is a memoir told in verse and, among other accolades, won the National Book Award for Young People's Literature.

It tells the story of Woodson's childhood spent between New York and South Carolina, and the feeling she had of never truly feeling like she belonged in either. Woodson recounts growing up as an African-American girl in the 1960s and 1970s in the wake of the Civil Rights movement, discovering her gift for writing, and searching for her place in the world.

Reviewing the book for *The New York Times*, Veronica Chambers said it would be to a generation of girls "a history lesson, a mash note passed in class, a book to read burrowed underneath the bed covers and a life raft during long car rides when you want to float far from wherever you are, and wherever you're going, toward the person you feel destined to be".

Talking Turkeys and Funky Chickens

Benjamin Zephaniah

Themes/topics: Poetry, Humour, Racism

Zephaniah is one of Birmingham's most famous writers and poets, writing both adult and children's books, and an actor (he played a role in the popular ITV series *Peaky Blinders*). *Talking Turkeys* is Zephaniah's first collection for children, and touches on heroes, revolutions, racism, love and animal rights. *Funky Chickens*, published in 1996, addresses vegetables, the Queen, racism, and more.

Zephaniah is the only Rastafarian poet to be shortlisted for the Chairs of Poetry for both Oxford and Cambridge University and has been listed in *The Times'* list of 50 greatest postwar writers.
