The story: Olivia Alez is delighted about finally living a life away from the royal palace in the mountains that used to be her home, after the Kingdom of Alez decides it doesn't want a royal family any more. Now she can finally give up boring princess lessons and learn about real things, like volcanoes and the ocean and space! But Olivia is completely unprepared for the world that awaits her. Thick, dark clouds hang low over the city, and the rivers that she so longed to see are choked with rubbish. Olivia, horrified by what she sees, becomes determined to get to the bottom of Alez's dangerous weather patterns, and sets out to solve the mystery and save Alez from climate destruction before it's too late...

Saffy is a good girl, tired of being told to stick to the forest paths, and always follow the rules.

Aurelia is a hidden girl, locked in a castle tower, dreaming of escaping the fate she's told awaits her.

Wild Rose is a fierce girl, raised by wolves, full of spells and fearlessness and cunning.

Together, they will change life in Silverthorne forever.

Enlisting her friends Margot Anderson and Wesley Evans, the trio begin their quest for their Camping Badge. Drawn to an abandoned factory nearby, they stumble across something strange. A square, ancient television and two tatty armchairs. Beside it, a wooden sideboard with an old photograph of a young, happy couple. What is this? Who, or what, lives here - and why?


Genre: humour

The story: Something bad is happening at Little Strangehaven Primary. What are the peculiar SHIVERS that keep striking the school, bringing Strangeness in their wake - from uncontrollable ballroom dancing to an attack by military chickens? Spy-detective Agatha Topps is determined to find out. She's the only person who doesn't forget the Strangeness as soon as it's over. At least, until new boy Lenny Tuchus turns up and remembers too. Their spydetectoring leads them to the Book of Chaos, an ancient text which has been hidden away in the Room of Forbidden and Dangerous Books. When Ema is sent to stay with her eccentric uncle in Prague, she fears she'll lose the chance to ever fit in. But then she meets Silvie. Soon the girls are meeting for secret midnight adventures, and facing Ema's fears together. But then disaster strikes. Silvie goes missing - and it's up to Ema to find her. Now she must gather the courage to hunt the city, find her friend, and uncover the secrets of the one clue Silvie left as to where she might be - inside the mysterious Midnight Guild . . .

ACTIVITY: MAKE A READING HAT!



Get the party started with a reading hat to wear whilst you join in the Virtual Visit

Use our template to design and make your hat, decorate it with your favourite book characters, or illustrate your favourite stories. Or design it to show what you love about books and stories!


You could even have a reading hat parade and hold a competition for the best hat!


What you will need:

- Coloured pencils, paints or pens or collaging materials
- Glue or double sided sticky tape
- Scissors
- Hat template from the next page
- A paper clip or fastener

Making your hat:

- 1. Color-in, paint or collage your design on the hat template.
- 2. Stick the top of the hat onto card if you'd like a firmer hat (don't stick the hatband pieces onto card as these need to stay flexible to wrap around your head!
- 3. Ask a grown-up for help cutting out the hat along the dashed lines of the template.
- 4. Stick the two hatband pieces to the back of the hat matching square A on the hat to square A on band one and square B on the hat to square B on band two and allow to dry.
- 5. Place the front of the hat on your forehead then wrap the bands around to the back of your head and fasten with the paper clip where the bands meet. This should hold the hat on your head.
