

CHARLIE'S

LUCKY PENNY

Charlie buys his Golden Ticket-winning chocolate bar with a penny he finds on the ground.

"Carefully, Charlie pulled the penny out from under the snow. It was damp and dirty, but otherwise perfect."

Can you help Charlie clean the penny so it is just as shiny as the Golden Ticket, using this smart science trick?

YOU WILL NEED:

- FOUR **OLD** PENNIES (Not shiny ones! The duller the better)
- FOUR CUPS OR MUGS
- PAPER TOWELS OR KITCHEN ROLL
- MILK

- HOUSEHOLD VINEGAR
- SALT
- KETCHUP
- WASHING UP LIQUID

CONDUCT YOUR EXPERIMENT:

STEP 1

Fill four cups one quarter full:

- One with ketchup
- One with washing up liquid and water
- One with vinegar and a teaspoon of salt mixed together
- ☐ One with milk

DEFINITION TIME!

PREDICTION: A prediction is a guess at what might happen in an experiment based on observation, existing knowledge or other information.

STEP 2

Which one do you think will clean the penny the most? Make a **prediction** and rank the liquids from "will clean the penny the most" to "will clean the penny the least".











CHARLIE'S

LUCKY PENNY

STEP 3

Now put a penny in each of the cups – make sure they are fully covered! Set a timer for 10 minutes and wait.

STEP 4

Once the ten minutes is up, take all four pennies out of their liquids one at a time, rinse them with water and put them in front of the mug they came out of (so you don't forget which is which!).



WHY DOES THIS WORK?

Copper oxide, which is the layer that covers your dull pennies, dissolves in a mixture of weak acid and table salt – and vinegar is an acid. You could also clean your pennies with salt and lemon juice or orange juice, because those juices are acids, too.

In conclusion, you might have thought that salt and vinegar is just your favourite crisp flavour, but no! It is also an excellent copper cleaning combination. Do you think salt and vinegar would clean anything else as well as it cleans a copper penny?

TOP WRITING TIPS

from The Roald Dahl Museum

Here at the Roald Dahl Museum, we love to help schools develop their writing so that children can create amazing stories, just like Roald. We uncover the craft behind the famous stories that children know, before enabling them to try out the same techniques for themselves. Our sessions focus on

We hope to see you soon. But until then, here's a few tips from Roald himself to share with your students.

Take notice of everything around you.
Roald Dahl wrote, "watch with glittering
eyes the whole world around you because
the greatest secrets are always hidden in
the most unlikely places" so look closely!

Keep a note of all of your ideas. Roald had a special Ideas Book to put his in but use whatever you like! His was only a normal notebook but he always carried it and wrote down every little idea. He said, "It starts, always, with a tiny little seed of an idea."

Be bold and go larger-than-life! As Matilda said, "Never do anything by halves if you want to get away with it. Be outrageous. Go the whole hog." 4

Use your senses when you describe.

Roald Dahl ate a lot of chocolate and that must have helped to write descriptions like this "...as the rich warm creamy chocolate ran down his throat into his empty tummy, his whole body from head to toe began to tingle..."

MAKE YOUR OWN

ROLY-POLY BIRD

If there's one thing that the Roly-Poly Bird is, it's magnificent.

See how magnificent a Roly-Poly Bird you can make by following the steps below.



YOU WILL NEED:

- Roly-Poly Bird cut-out (on next page)
- Loo roll tube
- Blue craft supplies
- Tissue paper or crepe paper in assorted colours
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- PVA glue
- Thin card
- First things first, use a glue stick to stick the Roly-Poly Bird cut-out (on the next page) to some thin card. This will help your final creation to not be floppy!
- 2. Now, decorate your Roly-Poly Bird cut-out with the most brilliantly blue craft supplies you can find. You might want to use colouring pens, paint, felt, sequins, feathers, pipe cleaners, pompoms, tissue paper or anything else you can think of.
- 3. Put your decorated Roly-Poly Bird aside to dry. Meanwhile, find your tissue paper or crepe paper and cut long, thin strips out of any colour that you think looks particularly magnificent. These will make up the Roly-Poly Bird's marvellous tail feathers.
- 4. Once you have at least 15 strips, find your loo roll tube. Carefully stick one end of each strip to the inside edge of your toilet roll with PVA glue. You want to make your feathers look as magnificent as possible, so try to fill any gaps around the whole diameter of the roll and fill it up as much as you can.
- 5. Once you have what looks like an impressive collection of tail feathers, get an adult to cut your loo roll tube to a length of around 4cm and cut your Roly-Poly Bird out along the dotted lines. Stick your loo roll tube to the back of your Roly-Poly Bird with PVA glue or sellotape.
- Wait for everything to dry and voila! You have your own magnificent Roly-Poly Bird.

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




