RESOURCE 1: CHRISTMAS GAMES & ACTIVITIES







Here are our top FIVE ideas for games and activities to spread Christmasaurus magic in your school this Christmas!

PIN THE TAIL ON THE CHRISTMASAURUS

Print out the picture provided on the following page, ideally in a larger A3 size. Then, cut out the accompanying tail template, and attach rolled up tape on the back. To play, divide your class into teams and explain that one member from each team will be blindfolded. Teams will have to give directions to help their teammates correctly stick their tails on the Christmasaurus.















PIN THE TAIL ON THE CHRISTMASAURUS











For Christmas this year I would like a lot of things that you probably can't give me, but a dinosaur would make me very happy!



Play this fun memory game with your class. Give students a copy of the stocking template on the next page. Ask them to fill in their stockings with lots of different presents. They can write or draw anything they like – even their very own Christmasaurus! The more presents they choose, the harder it will be for their classmates to remember.

Once they're finished, ask students to swap stockings. They have five seconds to look at their classmates' stocking before they are turned over. Who has the best memory and can remember the most presents on their classmate's stocking?

A CHRISTMASAURUS SNOW GLOBE

Test students' reading comprehension skills with these Christmassy crafting instructions!

What students need:

- A clean, watertight glass jar (e.g. an empty jam jar)
- Scissors
- White paper
- Pens, colouring pencils, or paint
- Sticky tape
- Water
- Baby oil (optional)
- Biodegradable glitter

Method:

- 1. Measure the height and circumference of your jar. Cut out a piece of paper that is the same height as the jar and half the circumference in width.
- 2. Cut or trace around the outline of the Christmasaurus below. Colour and decorate using pens, pencils or paint.
- 3. Wrap your paper around the jar, with the image of the Christmasaurus facing inwards, and secure it using sticky tape. You should be able to see the Christmasaurus by looking through the uncovered side of the jar.
- **4.** Now fill the jar with water. Add a few drops of baby oil. This will help the glitter to move more slowly around the jar.
- 5. Sprinkle a few teaspoons of biodegradable glitter into the water and seal the lid.
- 6. Gently shake the jar and watch the glitter snow travel around your Christmasaurus snow globe!

RESOURCE 2: Christmas music

One of Tom's Top Ten Things about Christmas is the MUSIC! Here are some fun and musical activities to get children in the festive spirit this Christmas and spread Christmasaurus magic in your school!

'Christmas songs rule. Full stop.' – Tom Fletcher

ULISTEN!

TO YOUR FAVOURITE CHRISTMAS SONGS

Step 1: As a class, come up with a list of favourite Christmas songs or carols. Listen to the songs together (or sing them in your school choir). Can students make a list of criteria for a successful Christmas song? Some ideas are below:

1. Uplifting and upbeat 2. Simple and clear 3. Catchy and repetitive phrases

Encourage students to use some of the key words when talking about songs: **melody**; **lyrics**; **verses**; **chorus**; **tempo**. You can find definitions of these words below.

Melody: the tune of the song. It's the part of the music that you often find yourself singing along with.

Lyrics: the words used in the song.

Verses: the sections of the song that have the same tune but different words. They usually come before a chorus.

Chorus: the part of the song that is repeated after every verse.

It is often the catchiest part of the song.

Tempo: the speed of the song.

Step 2: Give the gift of a Christmas song this Christmas! On the gift tags on the next page, ask students write their favourite songs, why they love them and what makes them such great Christmas songs. Swap and share Song Gift Tags amongst classmates!

TO THE CHRISTMASAURUS SOUNDTRACK

I HO, HO, HOPE IT'S SANTA

Step 1: Introduce students to the sheet music for one of the songs from *The Christmasaurus* soundtrack –'I Ho Ho Hope It's Santa' – by bestselling author and musician Tom Fletcher. Download the free sheet music here.

Step 2: As a teacher plays/sings the song on the piano (or you can listen to it on *The Christmasaurus* soundtrack), encourage students to reflect on what they are listening to using the prompts on the Music Discussion Cards on the next page.

Step 3: Have a go at singing and performing this song as a class or school choir! What actions can you add while singing to bring the lyrics to life? What other musical instruments can you use to add meaning and atmosphere?

YOUR OWN CHRISTMAS SONG

YOUR OWN CHRISTMAS CONCERT

Calling all Jinglers! The Christmas concert is often the most exciting event in the school calendar – a chance to get into the festive spirit and spread Christmas magic. Prepare for your own Christmas concert inspired by the Christmasaurus by following the five steps below!

Step 1: Choose a **theme** for your concert. What themes from The Christmasaurus story do students want to highlight in their Christmas concert? For example, they might want to focus on the magic of Christmas, or the message of acceptance and celebration of difference. Ask students to note down and share their ideas – how can they bring their chosen theme to life?

Step 2: Choose a **venue** for your concert. Where is the best location for the concert? Is it the school assembly hall, the library, or perhaps a location outside in the snow? Consider the number of people that will be invited.

Step 3: What **food**, **drink** and **decorations** need to be considered for the concert? Who can students recruit to help them in these areas?

Step 4: What is the **playlist** at the concert? Will it be a mixture of festive songs, carols and some tracks from *The Christmasaurus* soundtrack? Have students written any songs of their own that they can perform?

Step 5: Create and send **invitations**! Use the template on the next page to send invitations to members of the school community. Don't forget to include key details (time, date, venue) – as well as details of what Christmasarus magic to expect on the day!

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






ELFISH DOOR HANGERS








DECORATE A DINOSAUR








COLOURED-IN CHRISTMAS BUNTING
